Arsenal update



The Section 106 agreement governing the community benefits paid by the Arsenal as part of the developments is complete and planning consent has been issued. A relocation letter has been sent to all existing Ashburton Grove businesses, outlining relocation arrangements. Compulsory purchase orders have been made and the notices delivered. The intention to make road closures has also been advised.

On 29 April, Islington Stadium Communities Alliance (ISCA) - the group opposing the new stadium development - withdrew its application for a Judicial Review of the council's planning decision.

The application has been taken forward in the names of two private individuals and a High Court hearing has been scheduled for 24 July.

Eyes update

'Eyes for Islington', Islington Council's community volunteer initiative will help council officers tackle the problems of fly tipping, dog fouling, graffiti and vandalism through early and precise reporting. They have just recruited their 300th member. And they want more.

At the launch of the scheme on Saturday 6 July, TV celebrity and Islington resident Su Pollard praised new recruits for getting involved and revealed her own personal interest in the local environment.

Eyes receive a filofax-style pack with an identification number, a pad and pen, prepaid postcards and a special hotline number for reporting.

The council hopes to expand the scheme to schools later this year.

Trees ✉

I live just off Seven Sisters Road and would like to know why the trees which have died or been vandalised over the years have never been replaced? If the council doesn't have the money to replace them, can I or anyone sponsor a tree?

The council has planted 500 new trees in the last two years – mostly to replace ones that have died of disease or been vandalised on streets and public parks. The planting season for trees starts in October and finishes in April – why not call our Trees Service on 020 7527 4946 and ask about sponsoring a tree this autumn? Prices start from £45.

On-line payment @

I have just found out that you have a new on-line service which allows you to pay council tax on-line. This is great – it makes it a lot easier for people to pay the tax at their convenience. Is there any chance that the same facility will ever allow council tenants to pay their rent on line... I do hope so...

'i Pay', Islington Council's new on-line payment facility allows you to pay council tax and parking fines on-line quickly, easily and securely 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The council hope to be able to extend this to payment of rent in the near future. The on-line payment system went live at the end of May. Even so, the council has already collected more than £4,000 in council tax on-line. What would you like to pay on-line? Write and let us know.

Take a lead ✉

I have noticed Camden Council are doing a very graphic poster campaign about dog mess. Has Islington Council got any plans to tackle this ever growing problem on our pavements and in our parks with advertising - and more importantly - enforcement?

In the coming weeks, Islington will be one of many London boroughs showing a graphic new anti dog fouling poster. The campaign was launched in the beginning of June by actor Ricky Tomlinson of Royle Family fame. The hard hitting messages from the Keep Britain Tidy campaign comes after research revealed that this was the only way irresponsible dog owners

would change their behaviour. Islington's street sweepers do clean the highways as they go along and the council provide dog litter bins in parks. If you own a dog, please remember to clean up after it. Dog mess is not only extremely unpleasant to look at but a health hazard, especially in areas where there are lots of young children playing.

Owners who let their dogs foul our streets and parks face a fine of £50. Look out for Islington Council's forthcoming campaign with petshops, vets and supermarkets, to inform, educate and persuade dog owners about responsible behaviour.

Abandoned vehicles

There has been a large increase in the number of untaxed vehicles reported to our abandoned vehicles team in May and June. This has resulted in nearly 400 vehicles being removed over the eight week period.

Untaxed vehicles that are suspected as abandoned, have to be reported to the DVLA and are stickered to advise the owner that they will be removed within 7 days if not claimed.

The council has recently appointed a new staff to combat this environmental menace.

Greenspace staff accepted an award on behalf of Islington residents in recognition of 3,400 Christmas trees that were recycled last festive season.

Green Charity EnCAMS rated Islington's effort the best in London. Trees were collected from the doorstep, chipped and used as path surfacing and mulch in parks and gardens.



King's Cross day care

Checking that all's rosy in the garden at Islington's newest day care centre in King's Cross are centre user Theresa Campbell and care worker Felicia Malomo.

Gardening is just one of the activities enjoyed by users of the Carnegie Street centre for older people with dementia, who also get involved in art, cookery and reminiscence courses, go on outings and take part in singing and dancing.

The recently-opened day centre is in the former Barnsbury Health Centre which has been refurbished and redecorated and is also home to the Alzheimer's Association.

This is a very good example of a former public building being brought back into use. As well as caring for older people with dementia, staff at the centre also work with their carers to make life easier at home.

Plusbus is just the ticket

Older and disabled people in Islington can now travel free on three new 'haul and ride' bus routes between their homes and the borough's shops, leisure centres, and health and day care centres. The single decker buses have low floors and wheelchair access and can either be flagged down or caught at specific stops.

A unique partnership between Islington Social Services and voluntary organisation Islington Community Transport has set up the Plusbus scheme so people with mobility problems can have some independence doing everyday things.

Three buses run daily at half hourly intervals

between 11am and 3pm in circular routes around Highbury, Hillrise, Holloway and Archway. This new service aims to make life easier for vulnerable people in Islington by providing a direct link from homes, through the estates, to local health and day centres, and shopping areas.



Details of routes and membership forms for the scheme can be picked up at day and health centres or doctors' surgeries around Islington - or by calling Islington Community Transport on 020 7272 9550.

Mops at the ready



30 more Islington Council caretakers have successfully completed the British Institute of Cleaning Science course. This initiative is very popular with caretakers, residents and other councils.

The course aims to raise standards of cleaning in order to provide a high quality service. The caretakers focused on window cleaning, wall cleaning, high level cleaning, graffiti removal, cleaning of staircases, removal of syringes and mopping.

Ron Fowden the Brunswick estate caretaker, said: "I found the training invaluable and believe it has made me more efficient at work. I would like to thank Islington Council for the opportunity."

There are 170 resident and non resident caretakers. So far 80 have achieved the qualification. The council expects all the borough's caretakers to have completed the course by April 2003.

Benefit cheat escapes prison

Benefit cheat Michael John Tanousis narrowly escaped a prison sentence for illegally claiming over £56,000 of benefits from the council. The fraud was uncovered by Islington Council's benefit investigations team.

Mr Tanousis pleaded guilty to the fraud which he carried out over eight years and was sentenced to 120 hours community service only because he paid back all the money he owed the council.

Tenant evicted

Islington Council has evicted a tenant and her family from their home on the Elthorne Estate after her son was involved in a sustained campaign of racial harassment on the Archway estate.

Judah Robinson was part of a notorious gang who caused criminal damage and intimidated and harassed local residents. He breached an order banning him from the estate. He was caught on CCTV. The police assisted the council by identifying him.

The council applied for an eviction after the breach and were granted possession of the property. District Judge Stary commented: "There has been a flagrant breach of the order."

The London Plan

The Mayor of London has published his draft London Plan, and he wants to hear your views on London's future.

The plan recognises that London is one of the leading commercial and financial cities in the world. It states that the population of London is expected to grow by around 700,000 over the next two decades and the number of new jobs that are likely to be created will be more than 600,000.

The Mayor's vision is that London should develop as an exemplary world city, based on three interwoven themes:

- strong, diverse long term economic growth
- social inclusivity to give all Londoners the opportunity to share in London's future success
- fundamental improvements in London's environment and use of resources

Tell the Mayor what the London Plan means for Islington

Here are some key questions that the London Plan raises:

- should the plan assume that London needs to continue to grow?
- the plan divides London into a number of sub-regions. Islington is part of the Central London sub-region, where it is proposed that a third of the additional 600,000 jobs should be created. Is there sufficient capacity in Islington to provide its share of the new jobs?
- the plan says that Islington should provide 900 additional new

homes each year until 2016. Is this realistic?

- the plan says that, in Islington, 50% of new homes built should be 'affordable'. Will this mean that developers simply stop building new homes?
- the plan says that no borough should have a blanket policy that resists tall buildings. Islington's Unitary Development Plan says the council will resist any building over 30 meters in height. Should this policy be changed?

Islington's response

The Mayor has asked that comments on the draft plan be provided by 30 September 2002. The council is collecting the views of Islington residents.

The council's area committees will be considering the plan. Why not come along and make your views known? North area committee and South area planning sub committee are on 29 July. East area committee and West area planning sub committee are on 12 August. For further details of the committees please phone Tim O'Connor on 020 7527 3187.

A council response will be made by the deadline.

members of the public can view minutes and agendas on-line, while following the decisions of the new executive as they are made.

■ **On-line forms** - people have the opportunity to comment on performance, add a sports club, or complain on-line.

i pay **Paying council tax or parking fines is now even easier. Pay on time, on-line, 7 days a week, 24 hours a day.**

Log onto Islington Council's website www.islington.gov.uk and click on "iPay". Your transactions will take about 3 minutes.

Pay by the date shown on your bill with your credit or debit card from home, work or your local library.

Pay on time, on-line and avoid reminders, increased charges, summonses or losing the right to pay by instalments.

Paying on-line is quick and easy and will suit many residents better than other methods. In the future the service will be expanded to help residents make a variety of other payments.

Up to 20% of rush hour car journeys are part of the school run, yet two thirds of schoolchildren arriving by car live within walking distance of their school. And over 1million children in the UK are obese.
