

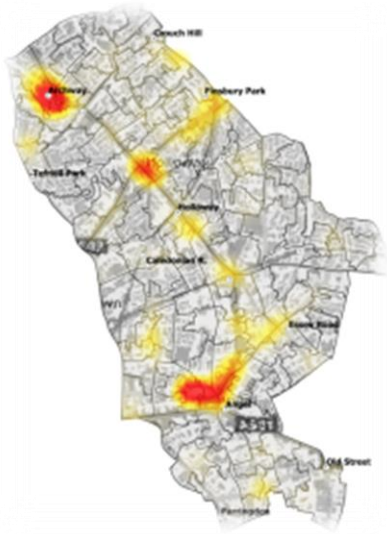

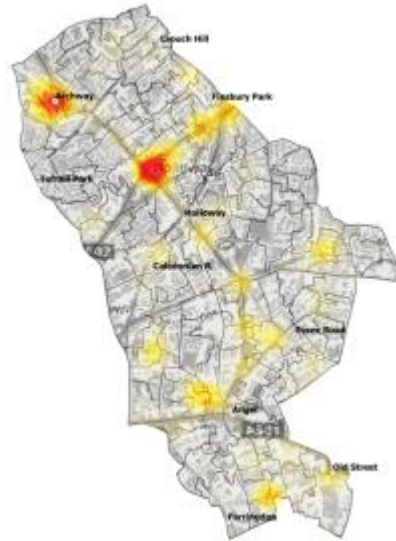

Spatial distribution

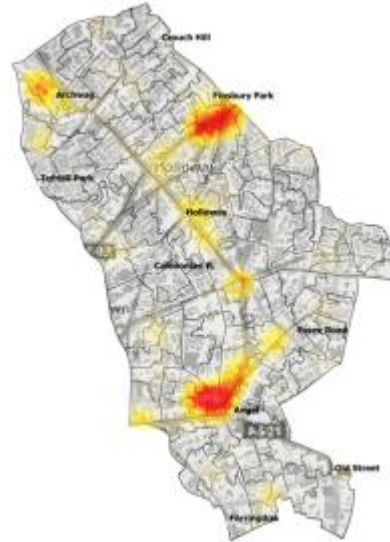

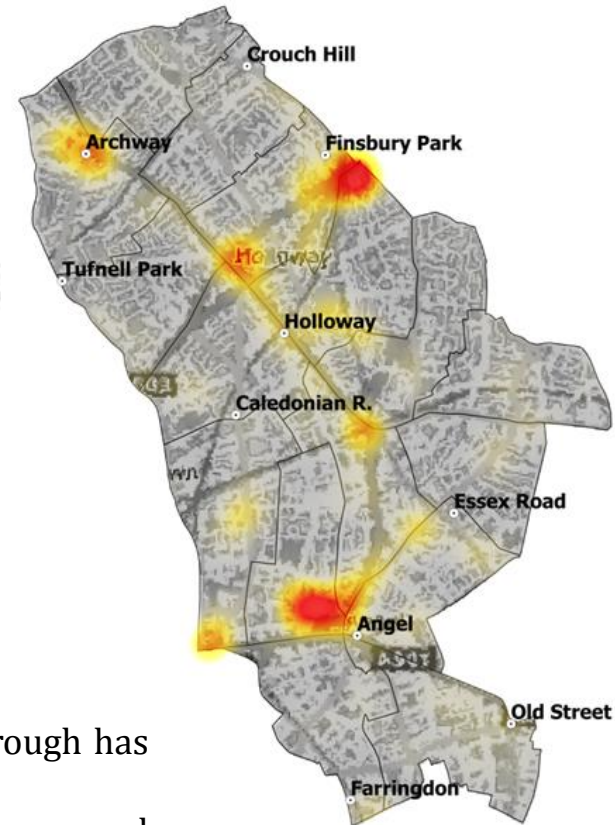

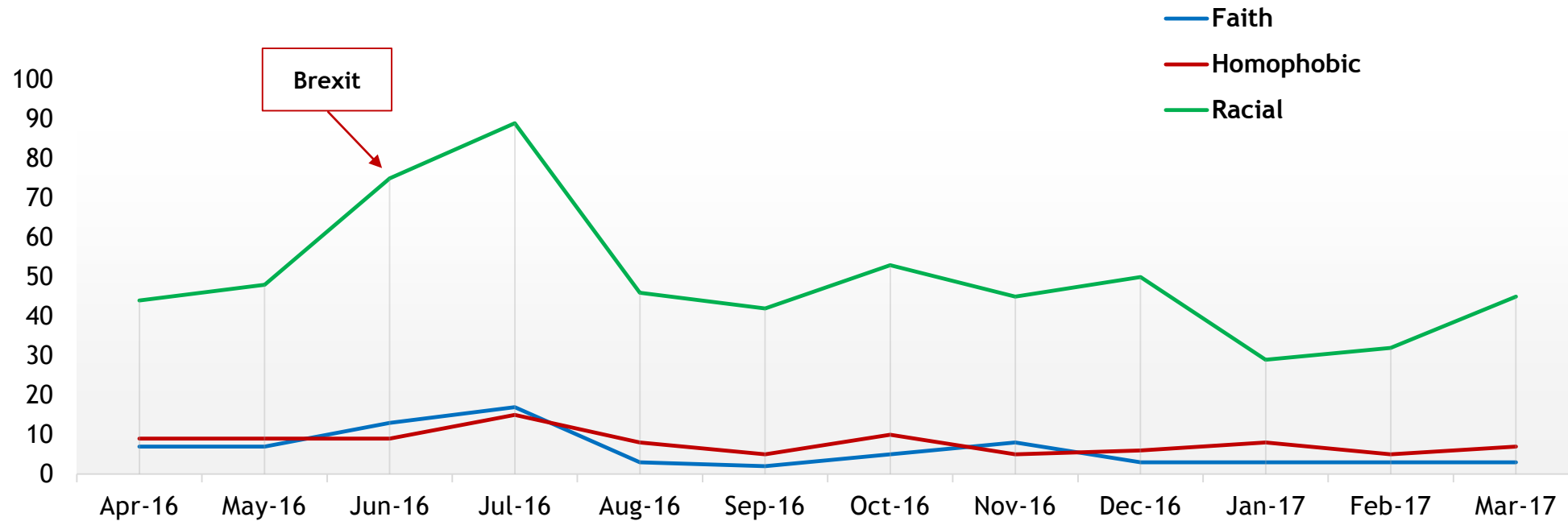

- These four maps show how the distribution of hate crimes in the borough has changed over the years.
- While in 2013/14 hate crimes were mainly concentrated in the area around Angel and Archway station, the last two financial years have seen an important increase in the number of offences committed in the Finsbury Park area.
- Angel remains the biggest hotspot for hate crime in the borough while the volume of offences committed in Archway has gradually decreased.

Hate Crime Offences - Islington F/Y 2016/17



- The financial year 2016/17 has started off with a sharp increase in the number of hate crime offences due to the result of the Brexit referendum in June 2016.
- Its impact has been higher on the following month, July 2016, with peaks in number of offences never seen in recent years.
- However, the effect of Brexit has gradually diminished and the number of offences has decreased from August onwards.
- Disability hate crimes have not been included because of the low volume.

Suspects' demographics

- The majority of suspects are in their 20s and disability and transgender hate crime are the only two categories where suspects are predominately young people (between 11 and 20 years old).

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- Similar to the suspects' demographics, most of victims are in their 20s followed by those in their 30s.
- Elderly do not appear to be particularly affected by hate crime in Islington.
- Black people are the most victimised in racial hate crime while people of Asian ethnicity are over represented in case of Faith hate crime (including Islamophobic).
