## Home shelter scheme

The Home shelter scheme has been set up to help people who have experienced domestic abuse to continue living safely in their own home. We offer an alternative when there appears to be little choice but to leave your home. We can help you by adding extra security measures to your home to make it more secure.

The Home shelter scheme can be beneficial because:

- Escaping an abusive partner, ex-partner or family member often leaves individuals and their families homeless.
- A homeless application to the council may lead to long stays in temporary accommodation.
- Moving to a new area, arranging new schools and nursery places for children, making new work arrangements and being further away from supportive family and friends can add to the stress already caused by domestic abuse.

# Who is eligible for the home shelter scheme?

To be eligible you must have recently experienced domestic abuse and be a council tenant.

If you are a tenant of a Housing Association or renting privately, you must contact your landlord as they are responsible for carrying out these works.

# What security measures can you add to my home?

We can tailor security measures to suit your assessed needs.





# Referrals to the Home shelter scheme

Domestic abuse advocates and tenancy officers can refer you to us if they feel security measures are an appropriate solution. Or, you can phone the Housing Solutions Team on 020 7527 6053 to apply to the scheme. A Housing Solutions Officer will support you through the application process to make you and your home safe.



# Types of property we can make more secure

For us to be able to make your home more secure, you must be a tenant in Islington. If you have a joint tenancy with the person who has been abusive towards you, we will only be able to make your home more secure if you have an injunction so that they can no longer enter the property.









### Creating a safe room in your home

The security measures we can add include the following:



- A 180-degree door viewer.
- Fitting solid-core doors to the home shelter room and main doors to the property.
- Adding stronger door and window locks and stronger hinges.







### Guide to the Home shelter scheme

- You can apply directly to the Housing Solutions Team or be referred by a Domestic Abuse advocate or your tenancy officer.
- 2. If you are eligible for the scheme and would like security measures added to your home, a Crime Prevention officer and repairs operative will visit your home to carry out a security survey. This will take place within seven working days of you being accepted onto the scheme and an appointment will be made with you for this.
- The Crime Prevention officer will send the security survey to the Housing Solutions officer.
- **4.Islington Council's Repairs Team** will carry out the work.
- 5. A repairs operative will then make an appointment with you to fit the security measures to your home. (If no made-to-measure or unusual parts are needed, work should be completed within five to ten working days.)
