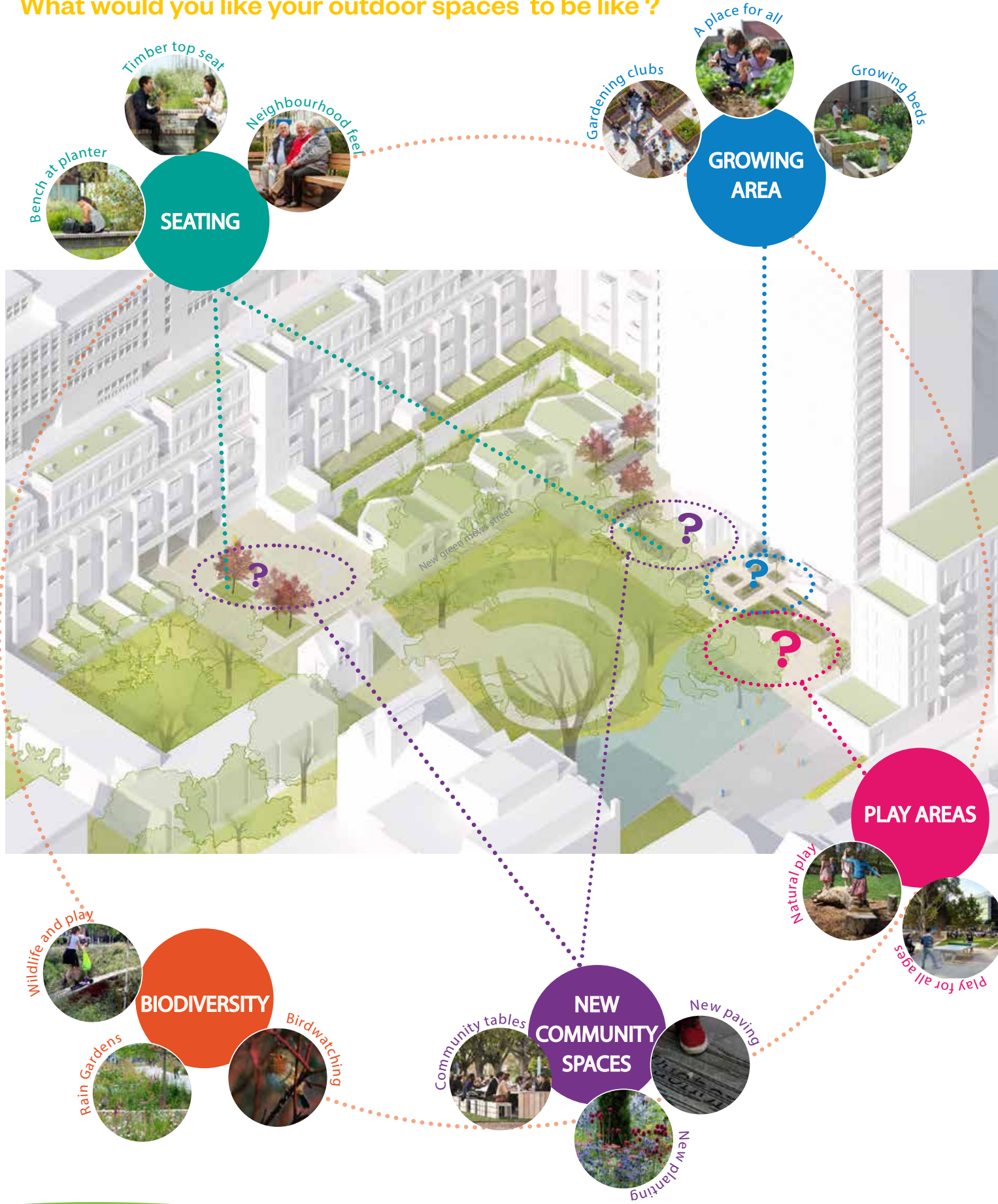


QUAKER COURT & BRAITHWAITE HOUSE

- 3 New planting and materials

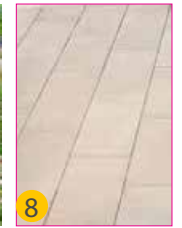


Illustration showing how the Community Square can look like

A shared community square

A series of community spaces with play, planting and seating

- 1** Bunhill Row entrance

A new level access entrance from Bunhill Row.
- 2** Braithwaite House forecourt

New planting and seating to give Braithwaite entrance a new setting. Bin stores tidied up and enclosed.
- 3** Community spaces

A shared open space with new planting, play and seating.
- 4** Sports Court

Existing Ball Court location, anti-vibrating fence and new sports surfacing



- 5** Play space

Play area improved with additional planting, new natural play equipment and existing play equipment.
- 6** Quaker Gardens

Transparent boundaries with the surrounding community spaces.
- 7** Private shared gardens

The addition of a shared garden for new Mews residents.
- 8** Community spaces-Quaker Square

New consolidated parking layout, new planting and lighting gives a new space to use. Vehicular access reduced to one way.

Braithwaite House forecourt

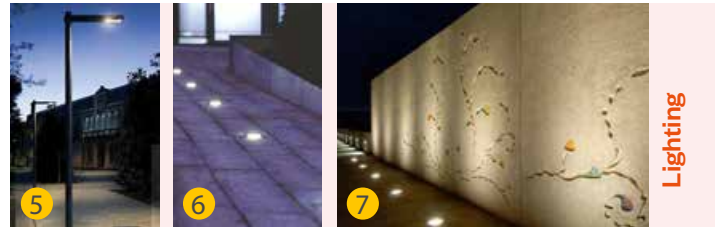


Illustration showing how the Braithwaite Forecourt can look like
