




National Poetry Day Selection

























This list of recommended reads for National Poetry Day is its biggest ever this year: 40 gorgeous new poetry books for all ages and stages to read, listen to and share.


Romalyn Ante Antiemetic for Homesickness

Steeped in Filipino folklore, and studded with Tagalog, these poems speak of the ache of assimilation and the complexities of belonging.

This is love at break-neck pace: the speakers of these poems are funny, reckless, exuberant even when examining the damage.






Natalie Diaz Postcolonial Love Poem

A beautiful and expansive archive of growing up in London as a young mixed heritage woman.







Don Paterson Zonal

A dark collection of 'New Scottish Folktales': tales of murder and madness, obsession and possession, and most of all, of magical transformation and mutability.






Safiya Sinclair Cannibal





Neil Astley (Editor) Staying Human: New Poems for Staying Alive
